Volunteers That SHINE

The ElderSource SHINE program volunteers light the way for many seniors and caregivers who need help navigating through the complex process of accessing Medicare benefits.

SHINE – Serving Health Insurance Need of Elders – offers free and unbiased counseling to

seniors and caregivers on their Medicare benefits. It is a vital community program that relies heavily on active senior volunteers to help dients understand their healthcare choices to make the best decisions for them.

Volunteers are trained and equipped with knowledge that they share to help seniors and caregivers make informed decisions regarding their Medicare and health insurance needs. SHINE volunteers are not only trained well, but they each have a heart to serve in their community. SHINE is a program of the Department of Elder Affairs and is operated through ElderSource.



"Our volunteers are extremely committed," said SHINE Liaison, Carrie Gonzalez, who leads the program at ElderSource. "When I see how dedicated they are, this is what keeps the SHINE program going."

SHINE volunteers are often a good reflection of the agency's dedication to serving seniors in the community. Without the SHINE program, many seniors and caregivers would not be able to access the resources available to them about Medicare and health insurance. SHINE volunteers are devoted to helping meet the needs of more seniors in the community.

"People are appreciative of the resources and help we give them," said Carol Sarni, Local Lead Coordinator for Flagler County volunteers. She has served seven years with the SHINE program in her community.

"Many seniors aren't aware of what's out there, so we are able to truly shed light on valuable resources," said Virene Garrett who has served with SHINE for six years. "I truly enjoy serving the community and getting the resources to those who need it most," she said.

"There is such a great need for these resources," said Vivian Rowe who has served seven years with the program. "It's a rewarding experience overall," she said. "We do it because we want to, not because we have to."

With a current roster of 46 SHINE volunteers, you can find them immersed in their communities, looking to make an impact while spreading information to help seniors and caregivers age with dignity and independence.

In Good Spirits: A Client Success Story

After a devastating car crash in the fall of 2016, Ms. Young, who is 63-years old, had no idea the emotional turmoil she would experience for the next year and a half while trying to put her life back together.

Ms. Young suffered a traumatic brain injury from the car accident and spent several months in the hospital recovering. While in the hospital, a close family member took advantage of Ms. Young's weak state and mislead her into signing over power of attorney to them. It wasn't until after Ms. Young had been released from the hospital that she realized, she had been left with almost nothing — no home, nothing in the bank and a small amount of personal belongings in storage. Sadly, Ms. Young did not remember signing any legal documents.



She needed help to start again. "I never would've thought I would be homeless or without," she said. With the help of friends, church members and ElderSource, Ms. Young was given support to get her life back on track. While her friends and church members were able to offer assistance to find an affordable apartment, because of her limited income and medical bills, Ms. Young was unable to move her things out of storage.

The ElderSource's Senior to Senior Fund paid the expenses needed to have her things removed from storage and taken to her apartment. The Senior to Senior Fund is an endowment created by the Delores Barr Weaver Fund coordinated through the Community Foundation of Northeast Florida designed to assist senior citizens in Duval, Nassau, Baker, Clay and St. Johns Counties facing short-term financial crises. The program is intended to resolve the present crisis, as well as the underlying causes ensuring the person does not become dependent on the assistance and can maintain living independently. Additionally, The Jim Moran Foundation

awarded a multi-year grant to supplement the Senior to Senior Fund in Duval County.

"It was a great relief," she said. "There was no way I could've done it all on my own without help from ElderSource." Ms. Young describes her experience as wonderful and she is grateful for the kindness. Now that all of her things are out of storage, little by little Ms. Young has been able to move forward in rebuilding her life. "I was just happy that when I was at my lowest, ElderSource was there to help and that's a good feeling," she said.
